Masculine and feminine I-Stems carry the distinctive *i* in the genitive plural.

Neuter I-Stems carry the *i* in the ablative singular, the nominative, and genitive accusative plural.

#### 14. Remarks.

a. **Accusative.** The original endings of the accusative of i-stems were -im in the singular and -is in the plural. These endings were gradually replaced by -em and -ēs. But the older -im ending is the regular form in (1) certain names of towns and rivers ending in -is, as *Tiberis*, *the Tiber*; (2) in a few common nouns ending in -is, as *secūris*, *axe*; *sitis*, *thirst*; *turris*, *tower*; *puppis*, *stern*.
